From both a business and community perspective 2009 was a very busy year. We handled more than 2.6 million passengers - one of the only airports in the UK to record growth, while the majority of the UK's airports witnessed double digit declines in passengers. While passenger numbers were up, total flights were down some 3,600 to 39,328 for 2009.

We know many local residents work or have relatives or friends among our 1,500 workforce and news that the airport is out-performing its rivals will be welcome news in today's economic climate.

The £6 million investment in the terminal enhancement is almost complete, ensuring we stay ahead of the curve in welcoming visitors to Belfast with a terminal that we can all rightly be proud.

Airport helps Priory College raise money for Haiti

Pupils at Holywood's Priory Integrated College, with assistance from George Best Belfast City Airport, have presented a cheque for £6,100 to Concern's Haiti Appeal.

Following the devastating earthquake, the school's Charity Committee immediately set about raising funds to help the people of Haiti.

On hearing of the pupils' fundraising efforts George Best Belfast City Airport donated £5,000 from its Community Fund, which was established to benefit community initiatives in the east Belfast and North Down areas.

Principal of Priory Integrated College, Peter McCreadie, said: "Pupils were moved by the scenes from Haiti and quickly organised a range of activities including collections around the school and some individual fundraising efforts.

"The school was stunned and elated when the City Airport contributed to their fundraising effort. We hope the money will make a real difference to those rebuilding their lives in Haiti."

Mariclare Gallagher, Educational and Community Officer at Concern, said:

"The funds raised by Priory Integrated College will help provide access to clean water and toilet facilities to over 50,000 people each day and give food and shelter supplies to families in 10 camps."

Up, Up and Away

A new departure lounge has opened at George Best Belfast City Airport creating 20 new jobs.

It's the first phase of a £6 million terminal enhancement and has been completed ahead of schedule. Customers are now departing from the new lounge on the first floor which is capable of welcoming up to 12,000 passengers a day.

The retail space has increased by 60% and new shops and restaurants include World Duty Free, WH Smith, Bushmills Bar, Harvest Market restaurant and Lavazza Coffee.

The BMI and flybe lounges have also been relocated and refurbished. The full terminal upgrade is due for completion in April.

Lord Mayor of Belfast Councillor Naomi Long said:

"Passengers will see a big difference when departing the airport and I am sure the fantastic new lounge and its facilities will leave visitors with a positive lasting impression of our city.

"When the terminal upgrade works are completed, Belfast will have an airport the city can be proud of and will be the envy of many other cities."

All hands to the Pump

The Northern Ireland Fire and Rescue Service (NIFRS) is set to benefit from the expertise of George Best Belfast City Airport Fire and Rescue Service in dealing with aircraft emergencies.

A memorandum of understanding will see both services share training, planning, advice and personnel in relation to emergency situations not only within the airfield but across the region in the first agreement of its kind in Northern Ireland.

Seamus MacMahon, Senior Airport Fire Officer at Belfast City, said:

"This agreement cements an already good existing relationship with NIFRS. Our expertise in aircraft emergencies has already been of benefit to the NIFRS in dealing with incidents outside the airfield involving aircraft.

"We look forward to training, planning and working with the NIFRS and sharing best practice in pursuit of continuing excellence in this field.

Chris Kerr, Area Commander for NIFRS, said:

"The technical expertise of the Fire Service at Belfast City Airport is a matter of record and this agreement will enhance existing NIFRS arrangements for planning for and responding to incidents with our Airport colleagues – particularly in terms of the

additional resources available to NIFRS. Effective multi-agency training will also make a significant contribution to public safety."

I started working in the airport in October 1993 on a job training programme and was employed in a full time position on the information desk in May 1995. Over the years I have also worked on the check-in desks, in meeting and boarding, and the missing baggage desk. I've also helped out with baggage handling and aircraft cleaning when needed! I would imagine the information desk is the best place for me as I'm pretty familiar with most areas of the airport!

Duties:
The main duties are answering telephone calls and face to face contact with our passengers at the information desk, where I give flight

information and help with general enquiries about flights and onward travel in the UK. I handle customer comments and look after the conference rooms at the airport. I also help out with school visits, which is a fun side to my role.

Most unusual enquiry:
I helped an American couple once who arrived in after travelling from New York via Gatwick only to find out they had travelled to the wrong Belfast. They were meant to go to Belfast, Maine in America!

Highs and lows of your job:
I am confronted with different and interesting challenges every day and I never know what lies in the day ahead which makes my job very interesting. I meet all kinds of people and I get great satisfaction out of being able to help them with their enquiries to try to make their travelling hassle-free. On the down side the very nature of an airport means there will be occasional delays beyond our control, perhaps due to weather or other operational constraints.

QUEUE CUTTER

Queues for passengers travelling through security at George Best Belfast City Airport have been cut by 50% thanks to new equipment and increased search channels.

The significant investment includes four new archways, increased staffing and the latest screening technology which reduces the nuisance alarm rate of harmless items. A fast track lane specifically for business class travellers has also opened. The work is part of the ongoing £6 million terminal enhancement project. Stephen Moreland,

Head of Security at the airport, says queues have been slashed.

"We're constantly making improvements to enhance the passenger experience. "No-one likes queuing so we have invested heavily in additional archways and the latest screening equipment which has significantly cut passengers' journey times," he added.
