Despite the ash cloud the business is out-performing the majority of UK airports in recording steady growth. George Best Belfast City Airport is hosting two Community Information Days on August 26 and 27 and we want you to join us!

At the event we will tell you how your local community group, charity, school or sports team can apply for support from our Community Fund. You can also find out more about airport operations from staff who will be on hand to answer any questions and you can enter a prize draw to win Flybe flights. Our Community Fund has already spent £31,000 helping local people including children with autism at Helping Hands Community Group in Tullycarnet and young people with Down's Syndrome at Cregagh Diamontes Dance Group. Tourism Minister Opens New £6 Million Facilities



Tourism Minister Arlene Foster and Airport Chief Executive Brian Ambrose enjoyed music from school children including Connor Browne from St Joseph's Primary School and Eve Truesdale from Victoria Park Primary School.

A £6million programme of terminal enhancements has been officially opened by Tourism Minister Arlene Foster. The Minister met members of the community and the airport's partner companies as well as construction firms and airport employees. She was given a tour of the terminal enhancements which include a new departures lounge, improved technology to speed the journey through security, new conference rooms and investment in car parking and front of house facilities.

During the visit children from the airport's adopted schools, St Joseph's Primary School and Victoria Park Primary School, entertained passengers with their Sonic Sound performance,

a specially composed piece of music on an airport theme with musicians from Camerata Ireland.

Among commercial tenants now occupying the new departures lounge are World Duty Free, WH Smith, Bushmills Bar, Harvest Market restaurant and Lavazza Coffee. Around 20 jobs have been created as a result of the investment by the airport's owners.

Arlene Foster said:

"These new airport facilities will be a major boost to tourism. I welcome the efforts made by Belfast City Airport in improving and enhancing the tourist experience in Northern Ireland."

Update

Runway

Following the Environment Minister's decision in March to call a public inquiry into the airport's application to extend its runway, we are awaiting clarification on what grounds the inquiry will be based. We hope this will take place soon.

Seats for sale

The Environment Minister is consulting on the removal of the seats for sale restriction with Belfast City Council, North Down Borough Council and Belfast City Airport Forum. The forum has not objected and we await responses from both councils.

We are the only airport in Europe to operate under this policy. This restriction is based on the capacity of the old terminal building which has been demolished. We installed a noise and tracking monitoring system last year to meet the department's requirements for the removal of the seats for sale limit.

Roof Tiles

A Civil Aviation Authority report into alleged damage to a house at Parkgate Drive by a plane arriving at the airport on June 8 has now been completed. This independent investigation reported that there were no anomalies in terms of the height or trajectory of the aircraft. The CAA investigation concurs with the airport's findings that the plane was not low flying. The airport is sensitive to the environment in which it operates and immediately dispatched a contractor to repair the roof as a gesture of goodwill.

Memorial to brave pilots unveiled

A memorial to the pilots of 804 and 702 Naval Air Squadrons, who played a vital role in combating the threat from German U-boats during World War II, has been erected in the grounds of the airport. The widow of a pilot who commanded dangerous missions on Catapult Aircraft Merchant (CAM) Ships in Belfast unveiled the plaque dedicated to the brave young servicemen.

Mrs Norma Wright, widow of the late David Wright, who was the Commanding Officer of 702 Naval Air Squadrons at Sydenham in 1942, travelled from her home in Yorkshire for the ceremony, which her husband had hoped to see before his death in 2007. Now, thanks to Mrs Wright's efforts along with those of the Ulster Aviation Society (UAS), and the Northern Ireland

War Memorials, a granite memorial stone and plaque have been erected close to the main terminal entrance. Dame Mary Peters laid a wreath at the memorial following its dedication by Rev Canon Cheevers.

Mrs Wright said:

"It is an honour to unveil a permanent memorial to these brave young men who helped save countless lives. At Naval reunions the war-time flying CAM pilots who had been based at Sydenham talked about their service and friends who did not survive. David would be so glad that the memory of his colleagues and their contributions were being marked."

What does your job involve?

The airport takes its environmental responsibilities very seriously and my job is to manage that part of the business. This includes assessing how the airport impacts on the environment and making sure it complies with environmental legislation.

I co-ordinate environmental initiatives including energy saving and recycling projects which involve staff and passengers. As with every airport, there are environmental issues including noise that people living nearby want to discuss and I'm the point of contact for that.

My role also involves informing staff of their environmental responsibilities and keeping them up-to-date on the airport's environmental performance. I am secretary of the airport's consultative committee, the Belfast City Airport Forum, and I sit on the airport's Corporate Social Responsibility team which co-ordinates the airport's community engagement programme and its Community Fund. It's great to see the support we can give to local community groups through the Community Fund.

Why did you want to work in this area?

I am interested in environmental issues, especially climate change and natural resource

depletion and recognise how important it is to tackle these issues to ensure long-term sustainable economic and social development. All businesses have a role to play in bringing about environmental improvements through their policies and practices.

How important is the environment to the airport? What is it doing to demonstrate that?

The airport is committed to sustainable development, which means striking a balance between the social and economic benefits of its growth and its environmental impacts.

Staff dedicate a lot of time and resources managing the airport's environmental impacts through its formal Green Dragon Environmental Management System, an independent marker of our progress. It's very rewarding to see the efforts individual staff are making. As well as energy and carbon reduction and recycling programmes we are keen to engage with the community on environmental issues through the Forum and other means.

What do you enjoy doing outside of work?

In my spare time I am involved in environmental advocacy through the Challenge Europe programme. My other interests include music, photography and ethical fashion.

Lead actor of George Best musical unveiled at workshops

Local schoolchildren were given a masterclass from some of Ireland's finest actors and writers at the launch of the musical *Dancing Shoes: The George Best Story*.

The musical combines the talents of two of Northern Ireland's most popular playwrights, Martin Lynch and Marie Jones, with the songwriting skills of Glasgow's JJ Gilmour and Belfast's Pat Gribben.
