At Belfast City Airport, we consistently aim to deliver an airport experience that exceeds expectations, and we recognise the importance of sustainability in achieving this aim.

As a key economic enabler, our airport serves as a vital connector from the heart of Belfast to the UK, Europe and beyond, opening our region to endless opportunities.

We are committed to doing this in a responsible way with our focus on our three core sustainability pillars: our environment, our people and our community.

In this strategy, we outline the aims and objectives that will allow us to take the next steps towards greater sustainability, not only at Belfast City Airport, but throughout our industry and wider society.

It would be naive to deny the threat climate change poses to our planet. We are therefore committed to the aviation industry's goal of reaching net-zero carbon emissions by 2050.

We have made significant progress to date, nearly halving operational carbon emissions since 2017; achieving Platinum Status in the Northern Ireland Environmental Benchmarking Survey for four consecutive years; and purchasing 100% green electricity since 2013.

Despite these successes, we recognise there is a significant way to go, however, our sustainability strategy is ambitious and will allow us to make even greater strides in this key area.

As a critical employer in our region, we also recognise the significance of our role in fostering economic growth and remain dedicated to providing equal access to employment across a range of roles and specialisms.

Belfast City Airport is rooted in the heart of the community, and with this in mind, we are committed to doing what we can to help our community thrive.

So far, we have invested significantly in our community through sponsorships, apprenticeship schemes and our community fund, which has donated over £580,000 to a variety of local initiatives.

This strategy outlines our aims to further enhance our community, building upon established initiatives to encourage sustainable growth and prosperity long into the future in an open, honest and trusting manner, to align our ambitions and drive meaningful change.

We understand that this journey towards greater sustainability is not just a destination, but a continuous effort to create a better future for all.





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Glossary

Term	Explanation
ACA Level 3 ('Optimisation')	Level 3 (of five) under the Airport Carbon Accreditation scheme which recognises active carbon management and measurable carbon reduction in airports. ACA is governed by Airports Council International (ACI) Europe. (page 16 and 35)
Biodiversity	The diversity of life at all levels from individual species to complete ecosystems. (page 20 and 34)
BITCNI	Business in the Community Northern Ireland is a not for profit organisation promoting and supporting responsible business. BCA annually participates in the NI Environmental Benchmarking Survey and is recognised under the CORE corporate responsibility standard – both managed by BITCNI. (page 34)
Carbon footprint	The total greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions caused by an individual, organisation, product etc. (page 16 and 40)
Community Fund	The BCA fund into which fines imposed as penalties for delays and departure noise exceedances are paid. The money is used to fund local community-based projects. (page 4, 20, 29 and 30)
CO2e	Carbon Dioxide Equivalent - a unit of measurement used to standardise the climate effects of various Greenhouse Gases (GHGs).
EMS	Environmental management system – a documented set of policies, procedures and instruction aimed at ensuring continual improvement of environmental measures and performance. BCA's EMS is externally certified to BS8555 Phase 5.

Term	Explanation
FEGP	Fixed Electrical Ground Power – system into which aircraft can directly connect for power whilst parked. Eliminates noise and emissions arising from the use of traditional diesel-powered GPUs (mobile Ground Power Units) and on-board APUs (Auxiliary Power Units). (page 18 and 35)
Green electricity	Electricity purchased on a tariff which guarantees supply is sourced from renewable generation, in accordance with a Green Source Product Verification process. (page 4 and 16)
GRESB	An independent organisation providing globally recognised ESG benchmarking for investors and business managers. BCA annually participates in the GRESB Infrastructure Asset Assessment. (page 17 and 35)
Net Zero	Globally, ‘Net Zero’ is a state wherein the amount of carbon dioxide we add to the atmosphere is no more than the amount taken away. For a business this means reducing emissions as far as possible and neutralising any remaining. BCA aims to achieve net zero for those emissions under our direct control (ie scope 1 and 2 emissions) in line with the ACI Net Zero 2050 commitment. (page 13 and 34)
Noise contour	Line drawn on a map which represents an area inside which noise levels exceed a given threshold. In BCA’s case this required threshold is set within our Planning Agreement.
Noise and track monitoring system	A system combining information from recorded noise events, radar tracks, and flight schedules to provide data used in generating noise contours and reporting on noise exceedances and track violations.

Term	Explanation
Scope 1 emissions	An organisation's direct carbon emissions – for BCA this includes emissions from natural gas use and onsite vehicle operations.
Scope 2 emissions	An organisation's indirect carbon emissions – for BCA these are emissions from the purchase of electricity.
Scope 3 emissions	Carbon emissions associated with an organisation's value chain – for BCA these include the emissions from our on-site tenants, passenger travel to and from the airport and from the landing and take-off cycle of aircraft operating at the airport.
Track violation	Unauthorised deviation by aircraft from specified departure/arrival tracks aimed at minimising noise disturbance. (page 33)
